Farnham in Bloom is about making Farnham an attractive place to live and work in or to visit; filling it with flowers and keeping the town and surrounding villages looking their best and encouraging people to work together. Farnham in Bloom is part of the wider Community Enhancement work for the Town with a particular focus in the summer months on:

Since its early beginnings, Farnham in Bloom has relied on voluntary commitment, local sponsorship (financial and in-kind) and support of local authorities and local businesses.




The tables below set out how this contribution has grown over the years, to deliver high standards and ultimately bring pleasure to Farnham's residents, businesses and visitors.



Projects for 2015 have included (i)

- Over 11,000 volunteer hours towards the in-bloom campaign from the Farnham in Bloom community group, residents' associations, businesses and others who have helped with watering, planting, litter picking etc.
- * Three new 'famous names' commemorative plaques added to 'Famous names of Farnham' wall, describing Farnham's local craft heritage and sports people on the wall of Sainsbury's and a new OR code to promote the names these people.
- Six Bells roundabout regularly litter picked by residents and the trees that were supplied by the Woodland Trust and are maintained by the Community Group.
- Dedicated Farnham in Bloom website pages together with links to tourism and local events.

- Twelve rural locations for Farnham in Bloom being watered and maintained by residents, businesses and local organisations.
- Seventeen schools and the Post 19 Group entered the hanging basket competition.
- New litter bins have been provided at locations requested by local residents and replacement bins in the cemeteries.
- Ongoing development of the Garden of Reflection at West Street cemetery and the biodiversity areas.

Al Impact

- Over 250 hanging baskets, troughs and planters including a new planter on Castle Street, and new troughs on South Street and Union Road.
- Colour-themed hanging baskets in streets throughout the town.
- * Newly planted areas include:
 - Bulb planting at Badshot Lea Cemetery and other locations around Farnham.
 - Seasonal planting of troughs, baskets and beds further extended in villages including Rowledge.
 - Schools' hanging baskets on display in Central Car Park.
 - Partnership with Bourne Conservation Group for Middle Bourne Gardens, Bourne Churchyard, Battings Garden and Bourne Crossroads.
 - · Whips planted at Shepherd and Flock Roundabout.
 - Nasturtium seeds planted at greenhouse as part of RHS Britain in Bloom's 'Green and Grey area.'
 - · Winter planting of beds.
 - Vegetable planting by Farnham Food Initiative at Sainsbury's.

A2 Horticulture Practice

- Development of 17,000 plug plants at Farnham Town Council Greenhouses.
- Use of peat free compost.
- Slow-release fertilizer added to hanging basket compost.
- Use of moisture-retaining gel in all plant containers and hanging baskets.
- Use of high quality plants, nurtured at the Council's greenhouse and polytunnels.
- Ongoing identification of new areas for planting including in the town's villages and at entry points into the town.
- Drought resistant plants for permanent planting.
- Village flowers maintained by residents, businesses and local organisations.
- Passing on knowledge through allotment lectures and quarterly Allotment newsletters to ensure good practice.
- Tree planting using native trees.
- Use of trees damaged in winter storms to create new habitats and encourage biodiversity.
- Watering is done by one member of staff and a new hybrid vehicle has been purchased to help with this and enable early morning watering.

History of Farnham in Bloon

Farnham in Bloom was born in 1989 at the suggestion of local businessman, Ken Kent, as Chairman of the Farnham Visitors Council.

"I wanted to make Farnham a beautiful place for all by bringing flowers into the town."

Farnham in Bloom was later adopted by Madge Green, a local resident and national judge of flower arranging, who recruited five other women to form a voluntary working group, which later grew to 13 dedicated women working alongside the Town Council and a wide range of local businesses and voluntary organisations.

The sole aim of the group was to make Farnham a beautiful town in which to live, work and visit and this was at the heart of everything they did. Every member of the group had their own individual role, whether that was keeping the streets clear of litter,

dead heading plants or ridding the town of graffiti. The group's keen eye for floral arrangements, led by Madge Green's experience, paid dividends in the success of Farnham in Bloom. Working to an overall theme each year and making sure that Farnham had the edge on neighbouring towns.

"It was really important that whatever we did looked fun and imaginative and colour played an integral part. We also wanted to impart a strong sense of a personal touch throughout the town," says Madge Green, "Sometimes, when I consider everything we took on, I think we must have been out of our minds – but oh, didn't we have so much fun!"

The Farnham in Bloom group began to take on so much that Madge Green took gave up her day job as a writer to take on the project full time. In 1990, the cost of funding Farnham in Bloom amounted to £4,000, rising to £10,800 in 1997 and £25,000 by 2005 before the project was handed on to Farnham Town Council.

Working morning, noon and night, it was inevitable that the committee soon became incredibly close with friendships that last till this day. Farnham in Bloom went on to win numerous awards year on year, resulting in a win every year, for 15 years. These included a number of awards from South East in Bloom and a special mention in the Queen Mother's Birthday Awards as well as being nominated to represent the South East in Britain in Bloom.

Madge and her team finally hung up their working boots in 2005, after 15 incredible years, when shimmying up ladders was no longer suitable and Farnham Town Council now continues their legacy to this day.

"After we stood down, I was delighted that the enthusiasm for Farnham in Bloom not only lives on, but grows, year on year, with so many local individuals and business showing their support."



2015 marks the tenth year that Farnham in Bloom has been led by Farnham Town Council, the Farnham in Bloom Community Group and a team of volunteers.

Farnham Town Council entered Farnham town centre into South and South East in Bloom for the first time in 2008 and since then has won the following awards for the Town Centre category:

A4 Business Areas and Premises

- First Enthusiasm for Farnham in Bloom by a whole range of local businesses including shops, pubs and professional services such as local solicitors, accountants etc. who sponsor baskets, display posters and stickers and wear Farnham in Bloom badges.
- Forest Lodge Garden Centre supports Farnham in Bloom by planting and maintaining areas around the railway station and parts of the town centre.
- Squire's Garden Centre actively support and are involved with all aspects of the Farnham in Bloom Community Group such as sponsoring competitions and prizes and hosting the Awards evening.

A5 Green Spaces

- Waverley Borough Council is actively involved in maintaining planting and general maintenance in the historic Farnham Park, Gostrey Meadow and car parks.
- Farnham Town Council is actively involved in putting hanging baskets and planting on all town centre public toilets, the Council Offices, the Woolmead town square, the War Memorial and the Famous Names of Farnham wall.
- Bulb planting to enhance gateways and new planters on the A31, Castle Street and South Street.
- Waverley Borough Council enters Gostrey Meadow into South and South East in Bloom, winning Gold in 2014.
- Farnham Swimming Baths Trust enters Victoria Gardens into South and South East in Bloom and the RHS It's your Neighbourhood, winning outstanding 2014.
- Year-round seasonal planting projects.
- Surrey County Council is actively involved with maintaining verges, hedgerows and footpaths to an agreed standard to provide an appropriate setting for the Farnham in Bloom campaign.
- Surrey County Council agrees to keep verges longer to encourage wildlife and making the first cut later in the year as part of the Alan Titchmarsh challenge.
- Farnham Riverwatch helps promote biodiversity along the river corridors.

B Environmental Responsibility (i)

BI Conservation and Bio-Diversity

- 👫 Wildflower seeds and trees planted in 2015 on grass verge in Dogflud Way to encourage wildlife.
- 👫 Butterfly count at West Street Cemetery.
- Bird counts at former disused Farnham Quarry.
- Conservation area in Borelli Walk.
- 👫 Wildlife garden in Middlebourne Lane managed by Bourne Conservation Group.
- Stag beetles encouraged at the Old Churchyard in the Bourne.
- Bat boxes made with children at Hale School for Hale Cemetery. Boxes put up in November with Surrey Bat Society. Bat detector purchased for use by local groups.
- * Battings Garden is a project being run by the Bourne Conservation to make it a desirable place for wildlife and attempting to balance making it attractive to people whilst improving Bio-diversity.
- All Town Council vehicles and two ride-on mowing machines run on LPG. Town Council agreed to purchase a new hybrid vehicle with facility for electric watering to minimise disruption with early morning watering.
- ₹ Wildlife habitats created in Farnham Town Council's cemeteries from winter storm timber.
- Only native trees and shrubs used when planting.
- 🤻 Investment in wildflower seeds in Bishop's Meadow and cemeteries.

B Environmental Responsibility (ii)

B2 Resource Management

- ♣ Annual 2014/15 recycling rate remains at around 60%.
- Waverley food waste recycling rolled out to all properties. Food waste is composted and returned to agricultural land as fertiliser.
- Recycling facilities located throughout the town centre in easily accessible locations.
- Regular cleaning of street furniture which saves long term costs of paint and chemicals.
- Use of peat free compost for hanging baskets and tubs.
- Hanging baskets contain reservoir in base to save wasted water.
- Information leaflets on the wormery, waste recycling and composting, Real Nappy Project and garden bonfires, circulated to local residents.
- Moisture-retaining gel in hanging basket containers.
- Water for town centre watering is pumped from the River Wey directly into the Council's bowser.
- Use of slow-release fertilizers.
- Allotment holders encouraged to rainwater harvest from sheds.
- Allotment holders have use of recycled compost at the greenhouses for community planting.







