About Farnham In Bloom



Farnham in Bloom is about making Farnham an attractive place to live and work in or to visit: filling it with flowers and keeping the town and surrounding villages looking their best and encouraging people to work together. Farnham in Bloom is part of the wider Community Enhancement work for the Town with a particular focus in the summer months on:

- A range of floral displays throughout the town and local villages including hanging baskets, troughs and planters with village flowers being watered and maintained by residents, organisations and local businesses.
- A school hanging basket competition as well as fun, engaging competitions to find the tallest sunflower, best upside down tomato in a milk container, largest pumpkin, best flower grown in a boot and the most impressive scarecrow.
- A Secret Garden competition for businesses, residents and schools which includes categories for the best:
 - Courtyard
 - · Hanging basket or container
 - Front, back or small garden
 - · Large garden
 - Public house, hotel or business premises
 - Shop front
 - Wildlife garden
 - School garden
 - The Madge Green Community Gardening Project Award – new for 2018

Since its early beginnings, Farnham in Bloom has relied on voluntary commitment, local sponsorship (financial and in-kind) and support of local authorities and local businesses.



Farnham in Bloom activity for 2018 includes:


- An extended year-round calendar of activities.

- Continuing our 'Bee Friendly' project as part of 'Help Our Pollinators' and 'Wild About Gardens' campaigns.
- Mew 'street tree' initiative.
- Railway Station Adoption scheme of Farnham Train Station in conjunction with South West Trains (now South Western).

A brief history



From its inception, Farnham in Bloom was managed by a local volunteer group for 15 years. In 2005, the group retired and the Farnham in Bloom baton was passed to Farnham Town Council. 2018 marks the 13th year that Farnham in Bloom has been led by Farnham Town Council, the Farnham in Bloom Community Group and a team of volunteers.

Farnham Town council entered Farnham town centre into South and South East in Bloom for the first time in 2008 and since then has won the following awards for the Town centre and Large Town centre categories:

- Gold in the S&SEiB Town Centre category seven times
- Gold in the S&SEiB Large Town category six times
- The S&SEiB Large Town regional category five years in a row
- The S&SEiB Chairman's Award for Post 19 and Bishop's Meadow
- Silver Gilt in the RHS Britain in Bloom Awards in 2014 and 2016
- Gold in the RHS Britain in Bloom Awards and Joint Category Winner in 2017

Farnham in Bloom grows year on year and involves so many dedicated local people and community organisations that help make the initiative what it is today. We continue the great work of the original volunteers, bringing people together to make Farnham and its surrounding village's even better places to live, work and visit.

Projects for 2018 have included (i)



- Free Bloomin' Kids Gardening Workshops over the Easter holiday for children and their parents.
- Bloomin' Litter initiative where local residents adopt an area of land to keep tidy throughout the year with the Council's support.
- Bloomin' Arts a mixture of art and dance projects for all ages to engage in Farnham in Bloom in a whole new way.
- 14,000 volunteer hours towards the in-bloom campaign from the Farnham in Bloom community group, residents' associations, businesses, community organisations and individual who have helped with watering, planting, litter picking etc.
- Extending the 'Famous names of Farnham' wall, describing Farnham's local craft heritage and sports people on the wall of Sainsbury's Town centre and new sponsorship boards purchased with all participating businesses, organisations and individuals.
- Adoption of Farnham Station in conjunction with South West Trains with investment in new planters and bringing flowers to the platforms as well as continued improvement of the area outside the station with in-kind planting from Forest Lodge Garden Centre.
- Six Bells roundabout regularly litter picked by residents and the trees that were supplied by the Woodland Trust and are maintained by the Community Group.
- Dedicated Farnham in Bloom website pages together with links to tourism and local events.

Projects for 2018 have included (ii)

- Working with the Bishop's Meadow Trust in developing the wildflower planting and new signage for the Meadow also installed.
- New bench installed in Boots courtyard in the town centre.
- An impressive new planter purchased for West Street traffic island to make a statement at one of the town's main entrances.
- * Extending and improving the Garden of Reflection in West Street Cemetery.
- St Mark's Church, Hale, new Incredible Edible project now in its third year, to encourage the local community to grow their own food and enjoy organic produce.
- Farnham allotment holders for the fourth year outside Sainsbury's in the town centre for the public to enjoy.
- ** Twelve rural locations for Farnham in Bloom being watered and maintained by residents, businesses and local organisations.
- Sixteen schools, entered the hanging basket competition and created baskets for Central car park.
- New litter bins and ash trays have been maintained at locations requested by local residents.
- Project with Waverley Borough Council and local businesses to remove unsightly litter bins from town footways.
- Extension of the Garden of Reflection at West Street cemetery and the biodiversity areas.
- Working with the Bishop's Meadow Trust to provide a wildflower meadow and a community orchard.
- Finhancement outside Farnham Railway Station continues with Forest Lodge Garden Centre maintaining beds.
- Vinyl wrapping of bus stops to simultaneously promote Farnham in Bloom, Farnham's green spaces and 'greening up grey areas'.

- * Hybrid electric vehicle allows for early morning watering.
- Clearing of large, unloved flower bed near Waitrose and planting with heather donated by in-kind sponsor, John Hall Plants, improving grot spots and creating new bedding areas to green up grey areas
- New Industrial Heritage and Art trails produced in 2017
- Farnham's second Walking Festival extended to two weeks with over 30 guided walks including the North Downs way, The Lanes of Upper Hale, The wildlife and conservation of Bourne Woods, Heritage, Wildlife and Conservation of The Bourne Valley and a Dementia friendly walk to build confidence and improve mental health through outside spaces.

 - Seasonal planting of troughs, baskets and beds further extended in villages including Heath End.
 - Schools' hanging baskets on display in Central Car Park.
- Partnership with The Bourne Conservation Group on the management of the Middle Bourne Lane Community Wildlife Garden including essential tree work.
- Nasturtium seeds planted at greenhouse as part of RHS Britain in Bloom's 'Green and Grey area.'
- Winter planting of beds.
- Vegetable and fruit planters planted by Farnham Allotment holders outside Sainsbury's for the public to enjoy.

Farnham Repair Café

Farnham Repair Café was established in the town in February 2015 by the Centre for Sustainable Design at the University for the Creative Arts (UCA) and local initiative Transition Town Farnham and aided by Farnham Town Council.

The Farnham Repair Café offers a monthly place and space at Farnham's United Reformed Church for Farnham's residents to come and get products fixed by bringing along damaged items in need of restoration, and in turn 'share in the repair'; gain knowledge and divert damaged goods away from land fill.

Electrical and textile-related products have been the most repaired items, but the team of repairers, which is made up of local volunteers and staff from University of Creative Arts, have also worked on bicycles, furniture, baby strollers, and vacuum cleaners to name but a few!

The Saturday morning sessions also look to provide product owners with a greater understanding of how their product works, with an insight into why repairing is a better solution to recycling or binning an item in favour of buying new.

The Otter Wey Trail

The Otter Wey is an art trail made up of 44 otter models in and around Farnham as part of a fundraising art project supported by the outgoing Mayor of Farnham, Councillor Mike Hodge, Blooming Arts and the Lions Club of Farnham.

Otters were chosen following evidence of their return to the River Wey and to raise awareness of the importance of clean rivers and waterways when encouraging rare species to return to the River Wey. The river is an important spine for Farnham, forming a wildlife corridor through the centre of town, linking important green spaces such as Bishop's Meadow, Gostrey Meadows and Borelli Walk, as well as forming part of Farnham's celebrated industrial heritage, firmly rooted in the creative industries.

The Otter Wey Project has reached all parts of the community, involving local schools, voluntary groups and businesses. The project has provided an opportunity for various groups to come together, and also allowed those taking part to develop their own creative skills and present them to a wide public showcase at venues such as public and historic buildings, local businesses and the local landscape.

Several guided walks of the Trail took place during Farnham Walking Festival and a self-guided leaflet was also produced for people enjoy the trail at their own leisure.

The best Otters will be auctioned at Farnham Castle this July. Money raised from the project will be distributed between Woodlarks and Brightwells Gostrey Centre which are the charities supported by Councillor Mike Hodge during his Mayoral year.

2018 Bloomin' Projects

2018 sees the third year of our Bloomin' initiatives, which include Bloomin' Litter, Bloomin' Kids and Bloomin' Arts.

Bloomin' Kids Gardening Workshops

School children make a major contribution towards the success of Farnham in Bloom every year. To get children involved and interested in their environment Farnham Town Council run a number of competitions and activities to involve them.

Over Easter four gardening workshops were held for parents and their children. The aim of the sessions is to make gardening fun and accessible and to encourage the next generation of green fingers. The sessions are led by Farnham Town Council staff and members of the Farnham in Bloom Community Group.

Activities include seed sowing, pricking out and arts and crafts. The children are able to each take a plant home so that they can continue to nurture it. This year, the workshops were enjoyed by over 100 children. Over the autumn school holiday, two bulb planting workshops will also run.

Bloomin' Arts

Farnham in Bloom has inspired the creation of several arts projects that involve the wider community over the last couple of years. This includes an exciting

collaboration with 'Blooming Art', a collage competition, now in its fourth year. The competition has previously attracted over 300 entries from the local community, resulting in a three-day exhibition at the Farnham Maltings during July. The theme for this year's competition is 'cycle'. Another large-scale project includes a dance performance by The Dance Movement, a local not for profit dance company in Farnham, called Farnham Blooming. This year's project, funded by a grant from Fanham Town Council, involves 200 children from in and around Farnham working with a professional dancer over an eight week period to create a dance, which they will perform before the judges of Farnham in Bloom and with the Farnham in Bloom float in the Farnham Carnival. This year's dance theme will focus on animals that live on, in or near the River Wey, including otters to tie in with the Otter Wey Trail.

Bloomin' Litter

Farnham Town Council is passionate about keeping litter off streets and keeping Farnham looking the best it can be all year round. In response to a Farnham in Bloom Community Group suggestion, Farnham Town Council has pioneered a new community-led initiative called 'Bloomin' Litter' over the past three years.

The Bloomin' Litter initiative encourages local people to pick an area they would like to help keep litter-free. Throughout the year, the volunteers carry out regular litter picks of their chosen area, which could be close to where they live or a road they regularly walk. The amount of time given from volunteers and the frequency in which they litter pick varies from several times a week, to weekly and others on a more ad hoc basis but at least at a rate of once a month. Farnham Town Council provides all necessary equipment including litter pickers, waste bags, gloves and high visibility jackets to the volunteers and insures the project. To date, over 50 people have signed up to the initiative from all over Farnham, including the villages and rural wards.

- Farnham Rivers Group conducts projects to improve the river Wey and its environment, including river bank enhancements, Himalayan Balsam removal and litter clearance as well as habitat building to encourage wildlife.
- Clearance of invasive plants by the Bourne Conservation Group including laurel at Langham's Recreation Ground (in conjunction with the Beaver Scouts) and Himalayan Balsam in the lower Bourne Valley.
- Planting by Waverley Borough Council in conjunction with The Bourne Conservation Group of 9 mature trees on The Bourne Green to improve the landscape and biodiversity.
- Farnham Park ranked among the best green spaces in the UK after being awarded a Green flag of excellence for the fifth year running.
- Farnham enjoys the greatest tree cover of any town in the UK (45% according to Forest Research, the Research Agency of the Forestry Commission) against the average urban tree canopy cover in England, which is 16%.

- Hop initiative a local community project with hop plants brought and grown in residents' gardens and allotments. Since 2014, hops are picked and brewed making a lager type beer.
- Programme of renewal/replacement of street furniture including traffic An allotment holder v barriers, litter bins, wall ashtrays, public seats and bus shelters.
- Regular press releases.
- Updates on Council noticeboards.
- Monthly activities organised and publicised by the media and on website and social media.
- Year-round in cemeteries:
 - Bulb and tree planting in cemeteries in the autumn.
 - Log piles created from fallen branches, from winter storms, and tree surgery for the creation of wildlife habitats.
 - · Biodiversity areas in cemeteries.
- The Bourne Conservation Group works with local authorities throughout the year on footpaths and open spaces and in 2017 constructed a flight of rustic steps in Sable Wood to overcome an erosion problem.

Conclusion and future developments (i)

Farnham Town Council is constantly striving to further enhance the town and seek ways to expand the Farnham in Bloom initiative and reach out and engage even more of the community. Plans for the future include:

- Continue involvement of local community from schools, businesses and voluntary organisations.
- Continue to grow upon the success of the Bloomin' initiatives (Kids, Litter and Arts).
- Run various workshops at the Council greenhouses for instance for those with dementia or small groups from care homes to aid with health and wellbeing.
- To offer local schools and youth groups allotment 'grow your own' workshops.
- Extension of basket and planter installations floral displays throughout the town centre and rural villages.
- ** Partnership working with Surrey County Council and Waverley Borough Council neighbouring Borough and County Councils along with their contractors, on specific projects to bring synergy and optimise costs.
- Adopt national Refill initiative to reduce plastic pollution and promote healthy hydration by making refilling a water bottle easy, social and rewarding.
- Purchase of polytunnel to expend the production of bedding plants.

Conclusion and future developments (ii)



- Continue to expand wildflower areas throughout the town to encourage bees and biodiversity.
- Continue to expand the Farnham in Bloom year round calendar of events.
- Continue to grow the Council's sponsorship offering, with the possibility of new packages and opportunities to maximise exposure.
- Continue to seek out potential grants and in-kind partnerships to supplement sponsorship.
- Maintain year round press exposure with regular press releases and continue to build relationships with local press.
- Grow relationship with probation service and community pay back scheme.
- Continue developing work experience placements and apprentice schemes offered to secondary schools for outside services.
- To consider supplying other parishes with hanging baskets and bedding.
- To consider more sustainable planting projects instead of annual bedding.
- Continue to improve neglected areas of Farnham in conjunction with the community.
