# Bumper crop of gold awards for Farnham in Bloom

The Farnham in Bloom team is on cloud nine after the town achieved what may well be its best result yet at this year's South and South Fast in Bloom.

Despite this year's campaign being run by a new team, they rose to the challenge and managed to net four gold awards, be the winner in three categories and win a special award for biodiversity.

Commenting on the result, Councillor Stephen Hill, Lead Member for Farnham in Bloom said: "It has been said before, but it is true that Farnham in Bloom is about so much more than flowers — it's about engendering pride, new skills and knowledge and making our town and villages better places to live. # Meet your rep

Each allotment has a site representative who will meet and greet new tenants, keep the allotments noticeboards up to date and liaise with us about a variety of allotment-related matters.

They should be your first point of contact if there is an issue with your allotment.

Twice a year, the allotment representatives, lain McCready and Lara Miller will meet to discuss matters affecting the allotments. The liaison group is chaired by allotment holder Robert Green and is an opportunity for representatives to raise issues that affect several plot holders, to report non-urgent problems and for us to communicate and consult on future plans.

On behalf of allotment holders, the site reps have previously raised concerns about overgrown trees shadowing plots, incidences of theft and irresponsible dog owners allowing their dogs to roam and foul on plots.

The site reps also get involved in the plans for the annual garden visit and Allotment Show.

# Keep the weeds at bay

If you are temporarily not using your allotment, please be neighbourly and put down some Mypex matting to suppress weed growth and prevent weed seed from blowing onto neighbouring plots.

# From the potting shed



# Tips from John Negus, volunteer and gardening expert

If you are a new allotment holder, you may be gazing with a degree of elation and trepidation at your

plot and hoping it will serve you well and it will, if you spend time 'taming' it.

Once you have dealt with any weeds or grass, begin by neatly edging your plot, using taut string, a half-moon tool and long-handled shears. Then, if necessary, use a spade to strip off matted grass and weeds and make a rectangular heap which will rot down into nourishing humus.

When you've bared the plot and are ready to dig, take out a trench a spade's width and deep at one end and barrow soil to the other end. If you've never dug before, insert your spade or fork vertically to full depth and invert the soil into your first trench.

Continue, keeping soil level, until you finish at the far end. Finally, fill the last trench with soil taken from the first trench. Ideally, practice a three-year rotation to get the best from your crops and minimise pests and diseases.

All you do is divide your plot into three sections. Let's call them A. B and C.

In the first year, plant
 brassicas – cabbages and their relations – on section A and lime the soil.

Fill section B, which should be well manured, with cucumbers, marrows, leaf beet, onions, peas, beans, lettuce and tomatoes.

Sow root crops – beetroot, carrots, parsnips and potatoes – on section C, which is not manured or limed.

Add a general-purpose

fertiliser to all sections two weeks before sowing or planting.

- Year two: Move A to B, B to C and C to A.
- Year three: Move A to C, B to A and C to B. Then return to year one.

Bothered by bindweed? Bunch shoot tips and plunge them into a deep jar of glyphosate weedkiller. Being systemic, it will travel to the roots and kill entire plants.

Beat horsetails by treading on stems to crush the silica, then paint or spray with glyphosate.

Tackle pests by growing crops under fine-mesh netting.

Allotment gardening is addictive and a joyous activity. It's good exercise, too! Your goal is a highly productive plot of choice home-grown vegetables and fruit. You'll soon achieve it.
