TWO MINUTE SILENCE

In this place, on 10th May 1916, what is thought to be the world's first two minute silence was observed prior to an agricultural fair and May day fair organised to raise funds for the British Red Cross.

At 11.00am all those gathered paused for two minutes as a token of respect to the memory of those who had fallen during the war, to the wounded, to the prisoners and to those who were fighting for their country.

CASTLE STREET

MILLENNIUM PLAQUE 2000 AD


Castle Street, dominated by the Norman Castle, the home of the Bishops of Winchester for 800 years, was the heart of ancient Farnham. It has seen visits by most Kings and Queens of England, soldiers of the Dauphin, and Cromwell's Troopers. It was the focus for Victoria's Diamond Jubilee; the announcement of the end of the South African War and, it is said, the first two minute silence in 1916. The buildings conceal within their walls remains of medieval, Tudor, Stuart, Queen Anne and Georgian structures. Verges were cleared and the street widened in the 1700s and early 1800s, providing needed horse-drawn access to the town houses.

Castle Street

10 Castle Street was built in the early 18th century by Thomas Piggott, a London grocer. It is constructed on the site of the Corn Rooms, a group of buildings, used either for storage, marketing, or the exchange of corn.






