

It was a year ago this month that we took on the management of Gostrey Meadow, Battings Garden, Riverside (from the Maltings to Kimbers Lane), Home Park, the Haren Garden and the Evelyn Borelli Garden.

For most of the year, we have been carrying out general maintenance tasks such as clearing and tidying up. We anticipate that you will see the fruits of our labour from spring 2021 when the spring bulbs emerge.

As the focal point for town events and a popular park for families, we've invested in the infrastructure of Gostrey Meadow. This has included laying new power cables, refurbishing the public toilets and playground. We've also planted bulbs and cleared and refreshed the planting.

South & South East in Bloom 2021

The Chairman of South and South East in Bloom (S&SEIB) has confirmed that the 2021 competition should go ahead.



The S&SEIB know that many people appreciate meeting the judges in person, so they are working on several options and if needed, they can resort to desktop judging.

Floral facelift for the Lion and Lamb Yard

Winter tasks to enhance biodiversity



- Look at your garden/ allotment from the perspective of a small bird or small mammal. Are there places to live, to hide, and areas of safety such as shrubs and trees fairly close to feeding areas? Year-round, is there a range of flowering plants and trees that will attract insects? Is there a range of autumnal berries providing seasonal forage for birds? Is there water available all year round?
- Before February, clean out and sanitise your existing nest boxes and put up new ones. Similarly, clean and sanitise your feeders and keep them filled.
- Inspect your fences are there are access holes for animals such as hedgehogs?
- Consider leaving an area of your grass long this year, together with a 'messy' patch of nettles or brambles or an unmanaged kid's corner.
- Refrain from clearing away leaves and dead stems until February - they provide overwintering cover for insects.
- Plan your planting and seed buying for the spring - select pollinator-friendly, openflowered plants and native wildflowers. Try to establish year-round flowering.



- Remember the value of companion planting near your vegetables - nasturtiums can distract white butterflies from your brassicas, marigolds (Tagetes) enhance the growth of many 'fruiting' vegetables such as tomatoes, squash and cucumbers, also attract hoverflies that will eat aphids.
- Consider planting herbs such as rosemary and sage, oregano/marjoram, and mints, which many insects love generating a healthy summer buzz in your garden/allotment.
- Join the Wildlife Garden Forum at www.wlgf.org - it is free and its website and newsletters are rich sources of information.

Changes are coming to Farnham
