This new festival is set to become an annual event with organisers ambitious to see it grow and sit alongside literary extravaganzas such as those held at Cheltenham, Hay and Petworth.

The Farnham Literary Festival will showcase the work of leading, emerging and acclaimed local and international authors and provide literary events for all and will celebrate the written word in all its many guises.

Farnham Town Council shall also be seeking out the novelists and writers of tomorrow with the Farnham Fiction Award.

Some famous authors connected to Farnham

Jonathan Swift (1667-1745)

Jonathan Swift is best known as the author of 'Gulliver's Travels'. He came to Moor Park in 1689 as secretary and literary assistant to Sir William Temple. Several of Swift's best-known works were written at Moor Park, including 'Tale of a Tub' and 'The Battle of the Books'.

William Cobbett (1763-1835)

William Cobbett wrote Rural Rides and was the founder of Hansard. For nearly 40 years he occupied a unique position of power using his pen to support the labouring poor by exposing corruption and dishonesty, earning himself the name, The Poor Man's Friend. William Cobbett is buried in the centre of Farnham at St Andrew's Church.

George Sturt (1863-1927)


On his father's death in 1884,

Sturt took over the running of the family wheelwright's business in East Street. His true ambition was to become a writer and he found his success in sensitive but unsentimental depictions of rural life in and around the Bourne where he lived. His books included The Bettesworth Book, The Wheelwright's Shop and A Small Boy in the Sixties. George Sturt is buried in Green Lane cemetery.

Jean Parratt MBE (1935-2016)

Jean Parratt wrote ten illustrated books on Farnham. From 2004 to 2015 Jean, alongside her husband Ted produced a monthly newspaper called the Farnham Diary.

Plaques honouring the work of some of these writers and others who have made a contribution to the life of Farnham, can be seen on the famous names of Farnham wall in South Street.
