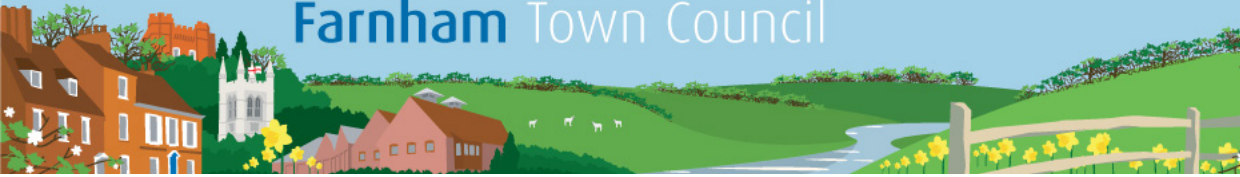

Farnham is looking for a new town crier to help keep residents and visitors up to date with important news and announcements. Local residents - male or female, young or old – are invited to put themselves forward if they think they are suitable.

As well as having a loud, clear voice and bags of self-confidence, the new town crier will need to be at ease in dealing with all sorts of people and to have a friendly, approachable nature.

Engagements will include Farnham's festivals and other key local events as well as making announcements about civic events such as the appointment of a new mayor.

The role attracts a small honorarium payment and out-of-pocket expenses.

The role of town crier goes back to at least as far as medieval times when most people could not read and needed a quick and easy way to hear important news, official proclamations and changes to local laws. In a time long before services like the police, and firefighters and street lighting, town criers also carried out night patrols to ensure fires were damped down at night and there was no rowdy behaviour.

In early spring, Farnham Town Council will plant a Jubilee avenue of trees near Brightwells Tennis Club. There will be a mixture of Himalayan Birch and Liquid Amber which will make for a stunning display.

Organising a street party just for residents and neighbours in one or two small streets is very simple and does not usually need a licence.

The advice is to plan early, particularly if you need a temporary road closure as the application process can take at least six weeks.
