

Farnham is recognised worldwide for our diverse community of craft makers and skilled artisans and is designated as England's first World Craft Town. With a rich history of educating some of the world's most iconic crafts people at our university, we are fortunate to have so many ways to develop new skills and express our creativity through making. Whether a beginner, or a professional maker, everyone can get involved in craft right here on our doorstep.







I. Visit an artist's studio, to see them at work and find out more about their craft. The Old Dairy Courtyard at Pierrepont Farm in Frensham hosts a collection of makers and producers and welcomes visitors on the second Saturday of every month. - 3. Get involved as a volunteer. Farnham Craft
 Town exists because of the passion and creativity
 of the people who get involved. Everyone can
 participate, whether helping with community
 workshops for local children, or distributing
 brochures in October Craft Month. There is
 something here for everyone. If you would like to

Farnham Craft Town is a collaboration between Farnham Town Council and organisations which include Farnham Maltings, UCA, New Ashgate Gallery and the Crafts Study Centre. Farnham Town Council funds the Craft Town Coordinator's role with contributions from partners.

Fiona Byrne who is a glass artist from Ireland will be coming to Farnham in February to be an artist in residence for a month. She will be visiting all our main craft venues, and will work in the glass studios at UCA to make a piece of art inspired by what she sees here. This has been funded by Farnham South Street Trust and is part of a five-year commitment to host residencies for makers from other World Craft Towns and Cities. For information about

Each market attracts around 40 producers who sell a range of items which they have grown, reared, made or baked.

A sporting chance

Farnham provides opportunities to play around 30 different sports with clubs for all. Farnham Sports Council aims to increase the number of people taking part in sport and physical activity. It also provides support and acts as a voice for the town's many clubs.

What Farnham Sports Council does

Farnham Sports Council was established in 1973 and was set up as an independent, voluntary organisation to support and promote sport and physical activity in and around Farnham. Sport matters in Farnham and we want to ensure that our proud sporting history and heritage is sustained.

Our most high-profile event each year is the Farnham Sports Awards where so much good work, incredible achievements and amazing talent just comes out of the woodwork.

How did Farnham Sports Council celebrate its golden anniversary

First, we held a 50th Anniversary event at Frensham Pond Sailing Club with a special presentation – in fact, it was a countdown of '50 sporting highlights' in Farnham from the past 50 years.

Secondly, in 2024, the sports council will be working with clubs and key partners to develop an environmental sustainability project in relation to sport. We will be monitoring our precious parks and recreational open spaces because we need to protect them for future generations.

What advice would you give to residents who might be thinking of taking up sport or some form of physical activity?

Sport and physical activity, first and foremost, has got to be enjoyable or, at least, worthwhile. When considering a new activity choose something you might be passionate about and/or join a club or activity with a friend or family member as you are more likely to stick with it. But think 'safety first' and be prepared to pace yourself.

Sport and recreation can do so much good for people's health and general well-being. And Farnham is lucky to have the best sports clubs and volunteers anywhere and they can give advice and encouragement. These volunteers are the heartbeat of community sport and is why they were placed at number one position in our '50 sporting highlights'.



Inclusive sport

Farnham Sports Council wants everyone to enjoy the benefits of sport and aims to support community clubs to be as inclusive as possible.

The following specialist clubs share more about what they are doing to provide sporting opportunities for people with disabilities.

Rowledge Disability Cricket Hub

The hub offers an all-inclusive opportunity for young people between the ages of 11 and 25 to play an enjoyable and fun format of cricket.

During the summer months, they deliver weekly cricket activities at Rowledge Cricket Club and in the winter months at Weydon School Gymnasium.

The coaches are ECB Level 2 qualified and are fully supported by the Surrey Cricket Foundation. They have full DBS accreditation and possess safeguarding and first aid qualifications.

It is always open and welcoming to new members of any ability who would like to play an enjoyable format of soft ball cricket.

Frensham Pond Sailability

Frensham Pond Sailability provides exciting sailing opportunities for children and adults with a wide range of disabilities or long-term illness. No previous experience is necessary. They encourage everyone to learn to sail either solo or with an experienced buddy to provide assistance using their fleet of stable, specially designed dinghies.

Sailors can develop their skills as far as they wish from relaxing cruising around Frensham Pond to racing at national and international level. Their sailors frequently comment that, when sailing, they are totally independent, freed from their limitations, and can compete on equal terms with any non-disabled sailor.

Sailing sessions are on Thursday and Saturday mornings from April to October.

Farnham Swimability

Farnham Swimability offers a swimming session at Farnham Leisure Centre on Wednesday afternoons between 2 and 3pm for anyone with a disability or who is in need of rehabilitation from injury, a stroke etc.

They have exclusive use of the pool so some members like to swim lengths whilst others just use the water for strength.

So you can discover whether Farnham Swimability is for you, it offers an initial taster session. If you decide to join their small group, the annual cost is £5 per person or £8 for a family. There is a 50 pence charge for each swimming session you attend.

It is a small friendly group and holds some social events during the year. If you would like to know more, please see their website www.farnhamswimability.org.uk where you will find a short video showing what to expect when attending.

Here to disrupt!

Farnham Town Football Club is one of the largest and fastest growing community clubs in the south of England. They have over 1,200 players competing across 70 teams which include mini monsters, walking football, the Saints (a team for young people with a wide range of disabilities and/or learning difficulties), under 23s, under 18s, vets and youth which includes seven girls' youth teams.

Every season, the club gives away 6,000 free tickets to children and families from local schools as part of its schools' outreach programme.

Since 2021, Farnham Town Football Club has been a drop zone for Farnham Foodbank. They regularly offer promotions such as free entrance for those who bring donations for the foodbank.

Farnham Town Football Club is a Community Interest Company so all its profits are reinvested into improving the club and its offering to the local community.

Farnham young people – supporting our future

Support and activities for Farnham's young people will be prioritised in 2024/25 with Farnham Town Council committing an additional £90,000 to its budget.

Both received an assessment which has provided
detailed information about their learning needs.
Feedback "My child has flourished in his confidence
and determination to succeed since his assessment
outcome. We have accessed the correct support
at school and as a direct result, his reading
comprehension, ability to decode words and
therefore maths, have all improved."





Talking Teens

Organiser space2grow

Grant awarded £4,000 community grant to run four five-week courses

Purpose of the project The accredited course allows parents and carers the time and space to reflect on their relationship with their teen. The course offers parents and carers practical advice on how to help navigate this stage of their child's development with empathy and understanding.

Feedback "We rarely take time to stand back, think and reflect on how we behave as a parent, and how this can impact on family dynamics. Young Cross Stitch Masters with Jane Browne, Surrey Artist of the Year

Organiser New Ashgate Gallery Trust
Grant awarded £1,000 community grant
Purpose of the project To offer a free community
activity aimed at families making craft together.
Participants were introduced to cross stitch and the
idea of taking it up as a hobby.

Feedback 258 people took part in the workshop. Participants said: "We wouldn't have done this at home." "My daughter is inspired to continue at home."

Sculpture workshop

Organiser Farnham Heath End School Grant awarded £500 South Street Trust Fund Purpose of the project Year nine fine art students were given the opportunity to take part in an all-day sculpture workshop led by an artist. Students were encouraged to explore structure, surface and found materials. They were supported to work outside their comfort zones and created some amazing experimental sculptures.

Feedback "We had a fabulously creative day."

Escaping into Art

Organiser Hale Community Centre – Girlz Club Grant awarded £390 South Street Trust Fund Purpose of the project To provide girls from the GirlzClub with a chance to paint their own canvas following the theme of 'Messy Meadow'. The girls learnt artistic techniques and painting skills and were taught about colour and texture and the nature around them. They were shown mounting techniques and exhibited their work in Hale Community Centre.

Hale Chapels' Garden

A pair of derelict chapels in the heart of Upper Hale are receiving national recognition after being given a new lease of life.

History of Hale Chapels

In 1871, the Burial Board of Farnham agreed to invite tenders for the building of two chapels, a lodge, gate and walls in what was to become Hale Cemetery.


Sidney Stapley who had a practice at 23 West Street, was appointed as the architect and surveyor. He designed the constructions to be built in flint and brick which are materials traditional to this area of Farnham. The work was completed in 1872.

Changing times


Over time customs changed, the chapels fell into disuse and were deconsecrated in 2013.


Having taken on the management of the chapels, Farnham Town Council worked with Farnham Building Preservation Trust to commission a report to assess the condition of the chapels and to seek proposals for their future use.

The Hale Chapels Trust was formed to look at several options. After exploring a number of proposals, it was eventually concluded that the buildings were too far gone to save at a cost that was acceptable and so the idea for a community garden was taken forward.










Creation of a garden

To achieve a space that was sympathetic to the chapels and the surrounding cemetery, Farnham Town Council enlisted the help of multi award-winning garden landscapers, Landform Consultants and chose a design created by Graduate Landscapes.

What you can see

The garden creators incorporated the chapels into a peaceful space. This what you can see:

- The chapel walls reduced to a safe height
- Flint setts repurposed at ground level to mark the boundaries of the former chapels
- · Seating around the corners of the chapels
- Decorative gable and arched head windows retained
- Gable window and stone mullions from the western chapel stabilised at a lower height and preserved
- Ground level decorative planters from the eastern chapel's gable window and stone mullions
- Planting scheme inspired by plants from the bible.



Award-winning

The gardens were officially opened in July 2023.

At the end of 2023, Farnham Town Council heard it had been selected as a 2024 regional finalist in the prestigious Civic Trust Awards. Reaching this stage means the Civic Trust consider Hale Chapels Garden to be of significant merit, and 'to be contributing to the quality and appearance of the built environment whilst being sustainable, accessible and providing a positive contribution'. The outcome of the awards was due to be revealed in January which is after this Residents' Guide was printed.

At the BALI National Landscape Awards in December, Landform Consultants was crowned Principal Award Winner in the 'Regeneration Scheme – Under £500k' category. The award recognises 'exemplary levels of professionalism, workmanship and client satisfaction the brings credit to the landscape industry'.

Climate change – join us in the

Steps we have taken

In 2019, Farnham Town councillors declared a climate emergency and committed to take action to reduce carbon emissions at a local level.

We are continually reviewing our operations and the way we deliver services so we can fulfil our aim to be carbon neutral by 2030. Some of the actions we have taken so far include:



Equipment

- Transitioning to electric or gas-powered vehicles.
- Expanding the range of low noise electric tools used by the outside workforce.
- Single use oil containers are no longer used.

Farnham in Bloom

- Reducing bedding plants by ten per cent each year and including more drought tolerant perennial plants.
- Planting nearly 400 trees in two years with over 9,300 kilogrammes of CO₂ captured.
- Planting 6,000m² of open space with wildflowers.
- Enabling 90 per cent of the bulbs in our floral displays to be reused by community groups.
- Choosing spring bulbs and spring flowers to support early pollination.
- Using peat free compost and baskets and troughs with reservoirs so that no water is wasted.
- Reuse plastic trays and plant pots.

Public spaces

- Seeking advice from a national expert in hydrology, geomorphology and plant ecology on steps that can be taken to enhance the stretch of the River Wey that runs through Gostrey Meadow.
- · Recycling bins installed in parks.
- Plastic flowers discouraged in cemeteries.
- Providing allotments so more people have the opportunity to grow their own.





Biodiversity

- Monitoring bugs and insects in cemeteries and parks alongside the Farnham Biodiversity Group.
- Organising environmental events such as the Big Help Out. In 2023, over 100 people volunteered to help Farnham Biodiversity Group create a 10-metre dead hedge. The hedge aims to increase biodiversity, provide shelter and a food source for wildlife.
- Supporting moth habitats.
- Installing bat and bug boxes to increase wildlife.
- Adopting 'No Mow May' where appropriate.

Community events

- No petrol or diesel generators used at events at Gostrey Meadow.
- Organising an annual Sustainability Festival with Farnham Community Farm.
- Sourcing recyclable plastic banners to advertise events.
- Avoiding single use plastic wherever possible.

Travel

- Providing Waverley hoppa Community Transport with £20,000 towards the purchase of a new electric bus servicing Farnham.
- Introducing a cycle to work scheme for staff.
- Offering Zoom meetings as an alternative to meeting in person.
- Complimentary shuttle buses provided for large events.
- Installing temporary cycle stands.

Town Hall

- Installing a new efficient boiler in the Town Hall.
- Move to LED lighting.
- · Buying more local goods and services.
- Cutting down on paper by introducing online forms and digital invitations for events.
- Switched from plastic cups to compostable or cardboard alternatives.

What you can do

In Surrey, 31% of the average resident's carbon footprint comes from travel, 31% from their home, 26% from food and 12% from consumer goods. Surrey County Council has put together some ideas for how you can reduce your carbon impact.

How to make a difference

Travel

- Cut down on car travel by working from home or taking public transport – see page 22.
- Consider car sharing or joining a car club.
- · Look at active travel options such as cycling.
- If you are planning a holiday abroad could you consider international train travel as an alternative to flying?
- Thinking about making the switch to an electric car?
 Find out if you are eligible for a plug-in grant.







Home

- Turn off appliances when not in use avoid leaving them on standby as this still uses power.
- Investigate getting your home insulated. This will reduce your carbon consumption and save you money on your energy bills.
- Switch to a green energy supplier.
- If you have a garden, plant a tree. If you haven't got space for a tree perhaps consider a hedge or creating a living wall.
- Get a water butt and use the rainwater you collect to water the garden.

Food

- Reduce your meat and dairy consumption.
 Even doing this for one day a week will have a positive impact.
- If you can, buy local, seasonal produce. The Farnham Farmers' Market is a great place to start.
- Look for ways to buy food that has less packaging and consider using refill shops.
- Save money and reduce food waste by buying only what you need.
- Grow your own in pots or on windowsills. If you have space in the garden, a vegetable box can be a very tasty addition!

Consumer goods

- Pause and consider whether you really need to buy a new gadget or item of clothing.
- If you want something new to wear, think about checking out the local charity shops or online shops that sell second hand clothing.
- When searching for something new for the home or garden, browse online groups and sites for preloved items or visit one of Surrey County Council's Revive re-use shops.
- If you have an item that is broken, before you discard it, see if the experts at Farnham's Repair Café can fix it. See page 23 for details.

Farnham Town Councillors have reinforced their commitment to the climate and have plans to involve the wider community in taking action to lead a more sustainable life.

A Climate Action Task Group has been created and a Farnham Town Climate Action Plan is being put together. It is intended that the plan will provide an overview of the positive work that is already taking place in Farnham, identify opportunities for collaboration and the alignment of effort and activities.

Farnham Biodiversity Action Group

Farnham Biodiversity Action Group aim to maintain and improve the biodiversity of Farnham by:

- Recording generating a record of existing biodiversity in Farnham
- Planning creating a biodiversity action plan to maintain and improve Farnham's biodiversity
- Informing aiming to be a key source of information for land managers, big or small.

Recent projects include creating a wildlife area in Gostrey Meadow. This includes a dead hedge which has been made from upright stakes of wood and filled with horizontal pruning. Despite its name, the hedge provides habitats for many species of wildlife and uses up prunings and clippings.



The area also includes bug and bee hotels built by a scouts' group and a hibernaculum which provides a home for frogs, toads and reptiles during the winter months.

In 2024, there are plans to plant a native hedge, build raised flower beds to provide pollinator-friendly planting and the creation of signage with QR codes so you can see how to introduce some of these measures at home.

Up to speed with local travel options

There's no doubt that for many people, travelling by car is their preferred mode of transport. Apart from the environmental consequences, the price for this choice is congested roads and too much time wasted from sitting in traffic queues.

Rail services

Farnham is served by two rail services operated by South Western Trains:

- Alton Farnham Aldershot Woking London Waterloo operating daily every 30 minutes (every hour Sunday mornings)
- Farnham Aldershot Guildford operating Monday to Saturday every 30 minutes (no Sunday service)

Bus services

The local bus service network which provides routes serving Aldershot, Alton, Badshot Lea, Elstead, Godalming, Guildford, Haslemere, Hindhead, Rowledge, Sandy Hill, Shortheath, Weybourne and Whitehill is operated by Stagecoach.

Most routes operate hourly during the daytime Monday to Saturday with only limited services operated during the evenings and on Sundays.

Door to door community transport

Waverley hoppa Community Transport provide a door-to-door service for residents who do not have access to any other transport. The driver will pick you up from your front door and take you to your pre-booked destination in the Farnham area.

Most of the buses are wheelchair accessible and there is an electric bus which was part funded by Farnham Town Council.

As well as saving you money, repair cafés also minimise waste and help to reduce CO_2 and other greenhouse gases from entering the atmosphere.


Farnham has its very own repair café which meets on the second Saturday of the month at the Spire Church in South Street. Bring along your broken items and see if the café can save you the expense of buying new or give new life to a treasured possession.

Success stories from 2023

Teddy bear repair

A 60-year-old teddy with a detached head and holes in his feet was brought into Farnham Repair Café.

Volunteer Jacqui used a lightweight bolt and felt discs to reattach his head and some clean wood shavings to plump out teddy's





Farnham Repair Café was delighted to be asked to replace the motor on a colourful carousel adorned with festive lights and playing music.

The rotation of the carousel is driven by a motor with a small gear at the top of the drive shaft. Replacing the motor with a new gear was a straightforward task but the small gear was bonded to the old motor and couldn't be reused and spares were not available.

Volunteer Jed decided to use a 3D printer which can replicate complex shapes and print them in a variety of different materials. To produce the necessary





component, Jed created the 3D geometry by measuring the existing gear and recreating the part in 3D software. The 3D geometry was used to tell the printer what to print.

The 3D geometry was imported into the printer's software where it was sliced into single layers of 10 Microns. To help understand the process, imagine taking an object, cutting through it horizontally and taking a photocopy of each layer. These layers were then printed one on top of the other to build a 3D part.

Once the part had been printed, Jed bonded it onto the new motor shaft and reassembled the carousel.

Cutting edge repairs

Volunteers Peter and Anthony produced two 3D printed kneecaps for inclusion in the knee rolls of a prototype circular cricket batting pad separately using a biopolymer

(PLA). A third print was used destructively to test the strength of 3D printed design.

The circular batting pad prototype incorporates various environmental innovations

and was designed by researchers at UCA as part of a government funded Circular Cricket Gear (CCG) project.

A shared vision for Farnham

In November 2023, business rate payers in 30 town centre streets voted to transform the area into a Business Improvement District (BID).

Becoming a BID town signifies a commitment from businesses to enhance the town which will benefit Farnham as a whole.

The BID will officially come into being on I April 2024. Its formation will see businesses in the BID area paying an annual levy. Over five years, this will deliver over £1.5-million in additional investment for Farnham.

The town improvement projects which have been agreed by voting businesses include:

- Initiatives to make the town feel safe, clean and welcome. Addressing key business issues such as retail security
- Business support delivering an active, strong lobbying and advocacy group and collaborating with partners such as Waverley Borough Council and Surrey County Council
- Incentives for improved access and travel so that people spend more time experiencing what's on offer
- Employing a town centre manager to implement the projects.





The BID board will work closely with Farnham Town Council and Farnham Chamber of Commerce to continue to build a town that remains a cherished place to live, work and prosper both now and in the future.

The Bourne

The Bourne is a vibrant village with shops and a large village green which has been the location for the annual Bourne Show for over 90 years.

St Thomas-on-the-Bourne is a lively church at the heart of the community and Langham's recreation ground has a popular children's playground. The Bourne Woods are owned by the Forestry Commission and have featured in several blockbuster movies.

The village is well served by community groups, sports clubs and activities for young people.

The Bourne Beautification Project enhances the appearance of the village centre. Volunteers help with watering the hanging baskets and flower tubs and carry out regular litter picks.

Hale and Upper Hale

North of the town centre is the area of Hale and Upper Hale. With a successful annual carnival and fayre held on the first Saturday in July, the recreation ground is a focal point for the village.

Adjacent to the recreation ground is an enclosed playground suitable for younger children, a tennis court and two basketball courts which are free to use. The recreation ground includes an 11 a side football pitch and a cricket pitch which can be booked via Waverley Borough Council.

There is a scout hut, cemetery, Hale Chapels' Garden, Hale Institute Village Hall, two hairdressers and The Alfred pub.

The area has a number of churches. Visit St Mark's to see Emily, the beautiful Edwardian pipe organ and murals painted by artist Kitty Milroy.

Hale History Project holds regular coffee mornings on the last Saturday of the month (except December) in Hale Village Hall, 10am-12 noon and all are welcome.

Heath Fnd

As the Army expanded in neighbouring Aldershot, the village of Heath End was formed. Rowhill Nature Reserve makes a natural boundary between the two towns: this ancient site is good for walking and provides a precious haven for wildlife and flora. The area is also home to Farnham Rugby Union Club and Aldershot and Farnham Hockey Club. Heath End is home to a private gym and the popular Farnham Heath End Secondary School with its all-weather pitch for community use.



Rowledge

To the south of Farnham, on the Surrey Hampshire border, is the village of Rowledge which has a thriving centre made up of a butcher, post office and convenience store, coffee shop, hairdresser, garage and pub.

The village green hosts a fayre on the second bank holiday in May.

Rowledge Village Hall hosts a range of regular events including the very popular Friday morning Coffee Spot.

Weybourne

Located to the east of Farnham, Weybourne has a village hall, sub post office, shops, Beagley's Bakery, pubs, private gym and recreation ground. Weybourne House was once home to John Henry Knight, inventor, engineer and local landowner. He is famous for building the first petroleum carriage for two people made in England in 1895.

Wrecclesham

On the southern fringes of Farnham is the village of Wrecclesham. There is a recreation ground which hosts the annual village fair, plus cricket, football and tennis clubs. Wrecclesham Community Centre is a focal point for local clubs and activities.

Wrecclesham acquired village status in 1840 when its first place of worship was built.

The village of Wrecclesham is best known for its pottery. To this day it is home to one of the best-preserved examples of a working Victorian country pottery left in England.
